

History of USS ALEXANDER HAMILTON (SSBN 617)

The keel was laid at General Dynamics, Electric Boat Division in Groton, Connecticut on 26 June 1961. As the second Lafayette Class submarine, the USS ALEXANDER HAMILTON was the first ship in the United States Navy to bear the name of the American patriot.

USS ALEXANDER HAMILTON was launched August 18, 1962. The ship was christened by Mrs. Valentine Hollingsworth, Jr., the sponsor and Alexander Hamilton's great-great-great granddaughter. Sea trials began on April 7, 1963. During the period from April 7 until June 12, seven different sea trials were conducted.

On June 27, 1963, ALEXANDER HAMILTON was commissioned at Groton, Connecticut two years and one day after the keel was laid. The ship's first commanding officers were Commander N. B. Bessac, USN (Blue Crew) and Commander B. F. Sherman, Jr., USN (Gold Crew). On 28 June the shakedown cruise began which culminated with the launching of two A2 Polaris Missiles on 9 August. On March 16, 1964, ALEXANDER HAMILTON was deployed to Rota, Spain where Polaris patrols were conducted as a unit of Submarine SIXTEEN.

From March 16, 1964 until January 1965, ALEXANDER HAMILTON conducted all Polaris patrols from Rota, Spain.

In January 1965, ALEXANDER HAMILTON was transferred to Submarine Squadron FOURTEEN and deployed for further missile patrols.

On June 18, 1967, the ship started its first major overhaul at Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics, in Groton, Connecticut. The overhaul was completed in June 1968 nearly two months ahead of schedule. After post-overhaul shakedown, the ship loaded missiles and began patrol fifteen. In June 1968, ALEXANDER HAMILTON became a unit of Submarine Squadron SIXTEEN and began operations from Rota, Spain where patrol fifteen through thirty-one were conducted.

In January 1973, ALEXANDER HAMILTON changed homeport to Newport News, Virgina. This lengthy conversion period resulted in changing the type of missile carried to a more complex Poseidon missile. The overhaul was completed by January 1976 and the ship was subsequently assigned to Submarine Squadron FOURTEEN, completing strategic deterrent patrols thirty through sixty.

In January 1985 Commander C. G. Mendenhail accepted the prestigious 1985 Secretary of Defense Award for Maintenance Excellence. The honor was bestowed in light of ALEXANDER HAMILTON's sixty-ninth strategic deterrent patrol, the most ever for an SSBN.

In May 1986 in support of the Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty (SALT II), plans were made to decommission the ALEXANDER HAMILTON.

However, as a result of the grounding of USS NATHANIEL GREEN (SSBN 636) the decision was changed to overhaul rather than decommission the ship.

In November 1986, ALEXANDER HAMILTON was transferred to Puget Sound Naval Shipyard, Bremerton, Washington for refueling and overhaul. In December 1988, the ship returned to Squadron FOURTEEN and completed strategic deterrent patrols seventy through seventy-three.

ALEXANDER HAMILTON pulled into Charleston, South Carolina in June 1991 to offload missiles in preparation for a return to the Pacific for decommissioning. August 23, 1991 marked official transfer to Submarine Group NINE, Naval Submarine Base Bangor.

April 28, 1992 marked the 1000th dive for the ALEXANDER HAMILTON. The most dives ever recorded for an SSBN. The final total of 1,002 dives was achieved on May 1, 1992. USS ALEXANDER HAMILTON (SSBN 617) will be decommissioned on February 18, 1993.
