Bates was commissioned in 1973 in Pascagoula, Mississippi, the first fast attack nuclear submarine named in honor of an American statesman. The Honorable William H. Bates served in the U.S. Navy for ten years, resigning his commission as a lieutenant commander after being elected to Congress to fill the vacancy created by the death of his father, George J. Bates. Congressman Bates served as representative from Massachusetts' sixth district from 1950



until his death in 1969. He became the senior republican member of the House Armed Services Committee and the second ranking House member of the

Joint Atomic Energy Commission. He was a vigorous advocate and effective supporter of the development of nuclear power for naval vessels.
